Can I use Raw Chicken Manure on My Garden?

Answer: All manures have to be composted before they can be added to any garden..



Always Compost Manures Before Use

Know the Health of your Flock

Composting to the proper temperature of 160 degrees for a period of five to six weeks is required, as harmful Pathogens such as Salmonella, Cryptosporidium and E-coli can be found in raw chicken manure.



Composting to the proper temperature kills most pathogens.

Raw Chicken Manure Can Burn Plants

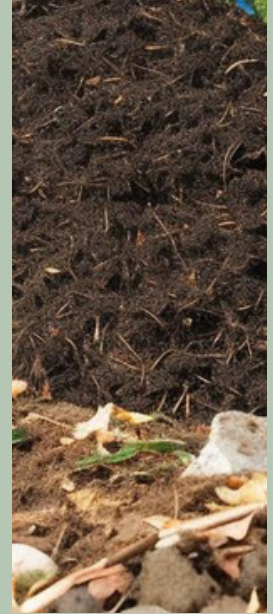
Raw it is high in nitrogen and salts, it can burn and damage plants

Composted it is a great soil amendment



Composted it works well with

- *flower beds, shrubs, vegetables*



Benefits of composting properly

- provides a slow release of stabilized nutrients
- in addition to killing most pathogens it kills most weed seeds
- great to reduce wastes from yard, garden, kitchen



Always have your soil tested so you will know the nutrients it requires.

More than Manure Comes out of the Coop

Proper Composting is Necessary

It is not just manure.

In addition to manure the coop contains bedding, feathers, eggshells, urine, uneaten food, as well as other bits and pieces of debris. All of which, when properly composted will become an amazing material that can be beneficial for plants and the soil.



Slowly releasing nutrients high in nitrogen, potassium, phosphorus and calcium as well as smaller amounts of magnesium, sulfur, iron, copper, zinc to name a few secondary plant foods.

Some uses for compost are:

- apply to the lawn as a top dressing
- mulch garden plants
- before planting flowers beds mix with the soil
- make your own potting mix for outdoor containers by adding to peat moss, bagged topsoil, perlite
- give away to friends and neighbors



make sure to properly compost before using

Always follow food safety guidelines

Washing produce before eating is good practice.

Fruits and vegetables from the garden can come in contact with the soil.



When Harvesting

- brush off excess soil
- wash before eating
- find that favorite recipe
