Have a Reason to Prune Remove Branches that are:

- dead or damaged
- rubbing together
- low lying and may pose a hazard
- rubbing together
- rubbing against buildings

Remove

• suckers from around the bottom

If Pruning is Necessary

Proper Tools and Guidance are a Must

You will need clean, sharp tools to be able to make clean cuts. It is advisable to keep your feet on the ground while pruning.

Proper Pruning can Help the Tree By:

• removing dead or injured branches as well as branches that may cause injury to the tree, property, or people

Improper Pruning can Injure the Tree By:

- Reducing it's ability to produce food
- Sun scald can occur to the interior branches that were protected from the lost branches.
- New branches though plentiful are often very weak and don't fare well in storms.

Prune For a Reason

Of all the gardening tasks pruning is one of the most baffling. As a result, many plants are pruned beyond recognition and damaged annually by well-meaning gardeners.



Beleiving it is necessary, the practice of lopping the tops off of crape myrtle trees or 'topping' AKA 'Crape Murder' become an all too common annual ritual by some gardeners.

Pruning causes Wounds

- Wounds especially new wounds provide opportunity for infection and insect entry.
- Improper pruning can cause poor growth, permanent scaring, a weakened plant, a shortened the lifespan, and poor performance



Just Say No To Needless Pruning

Topping Can Lead to Tree Decline

Inviting Disease and Insects

Possible long term injuries to the tree can occur thus shortening it's lifespan.



Included but not limited to are:

- Reducing the ability of the tree to produce food
- Sun scald can occur to the interior branches once protected from those lost.
- New branches though plentiful are often very weak and can't fare well in storms.
- More susceptible to insect attack and disease
- Insect Crape Myrtle Bark Scale is attracked to open wounds
