- Apricot

*Due to conditions beyond our control, all plants listed may not be available.*



# Where do the plants come from?

**Citrus is grown in a greenhouse, by a licensed grower located within the quarantine area.**

**Tropicals and Sub Tropicals are grown in a controlled environment.**

- *Since they have been grown in a controlled environment you will need to harden them off, if you plant them outside.*
- *Hardening off is the process of acclimating your new plant to conditions outside of the greenhouse.*
- *This is usually done over a period of weeks where the plants are exposed for a few hours each day to conditions outside that are similar to where they will be grown.*
- *For citrus wait until two weeks after the last frost before planting in the ground*
- *For tropicals and sub tropicals follow specified instructions for each, many will need to remain in pots.*



*You will be transplanting your plants before you know it and enjoying their bounty soon!*
